Natural Hazard Preparedness Checklist for Businesses

Develop a business continuity plan outlining operations maintenance procedures during and after a disaster. Ensure the plan includes roles and responsibilities, communication strategies, and recovery steps. Here is a check list to help you get started:

Risk Assessment and Planning

- Identify potential natural hazards affecting Puerto Rico.
- Assess risks and vulnerabilities specific to your business location.
- Develop a business continuity plan with roles, responsibilities, and recovery procedures.

Data and Asset Protection

- Backup critical data regularly and store off-site.
- Secure physical assets with storm shutters and reinforced structures.
- Implement data encryption and access controls.

Communication and Training

- Establish an emergency communication plan with multiple contact methods.
- Conduct regular training on evacuation procedures and emergency protocols.
- Ensure employees understand their roles during emergencies.

Emergency Supplies and Equipment

- Prepare emergency kits with essentials like first aid, water, and food.
- Maintain backup power sources (generators) and essential equipment.
- Install surge protectors and UPS for critical systems.

Insurance and Financial Preparedness

- Review insurance policies for adequate coverage of natural hazards.
- Maintain financial reserves for emergency expenses and business interruption.
- Keep detailed records of assets and inventory for insurance claims.
- Utilize FEMA's Business Continuity Planning Suite: A set of tools to help businesses plan ahead for disasters.
